

What next – Project Iris, Growing Hope



Inclusion Education was one of 79 charities nationally to receive part of £10m in government funding as part of the Suicide Prevention plan.

The programme, Project Iris, will offer help and support to yoong people from 11 to 25 experiencing suicidal ideation, thoughts or self-harm with a six week course that combines learning with green therapies. Our aim is to support better understanding of mental health and well-being and help to develop strategies and scaffolding to support young people going forward.
